



GENERAL RULES

- 1. Admission \$10.00; Children 12 and under FREE.
- 2. Senior Citizens (age 60+) \$8.00 Friday, Saturday & Sunday.
- 3. Veteran's Discount (with valid I.D.) \$8.00 Friday, Saturday & Sunday.
- 4. Three Day Pass \$25.00; may be purchased up to the Friday of the fair.
- 5. All entry blanks must be sent to committee heads.
- 6. Exhibits are open to all.
- 7. No Industrial Exhibitor may remove exhibits before 9:00 pm, Sunday of the fair.
- 8. Cattle, Sheep & Poultry must be on the grounds before 6:00 pm on Friday of the fair.
- 9. Grounds will be policed from Thursday night before the Fair thru the Monday after the fair.
- 10. **NO DOGS ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS** with the exceptions of service dogs and pet parade dogs.
- 11. All invoices must be submitted to the Fair on or before September 15, 2023 to P.O. Box 314, Bridgewater, CT 06752.
- 12. No unauthorized motorized vehicles allowed on the Fair Grounds.



FAIR REGULATIONS

- 1. All exhibitors must have their stock ready for inspection Saturday at 10:00 am or the committee will not be responsible for neglect in judging them.
- 2. No premiums will be paid on the dates of the Fair, except where otherwise stated. Premium list must be given directly to the Treasurer.
- All premiums awarded will be paid after October 1, 2023 by the Treasurer without solicitation, but if any exhibitor fails to receive his premium by November 1, 2023, they should notify the Treasurer, giving their mailing address.
- 4. The officers will use all precautions for the safety of goods on exhibitions, but in no case will be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur. Goods will be housed in tents, which will be patrolled nightly.
- 5. No animal or article shall receive first money unless shown against competition. Where there is no competition, blue ribbon and second place premium will be paid.
- 6. If the receipts should not be sufficient to pay the premiums in full, a proportionate reduction will be made in all classes.
- 7. The Bridgewater Fire Department will not be responsible for any damage done to persons, teams, automobiles, etc.
- 8. No vehicles are permitted on the grounds prior to 6:00 pm, Sunday of the fair.
- 9. All livestock must remain on exhibit until 6:00 pm, Sunday of the fair.
- 10. All concessionaires must pay full amount of privilege before setting up stand and doing business.
- 11. All vehicles carrying animals must enter the **North Gate**. **NO EXCEPTIONS ARE TO BE MADE TO THIS RULE**. No camping allowed on Fair Grounds.
- 12. It is important that the number of animals be specified on the entry. This is necessary so that the Livestock Committee can reserve the proper number of ties for each entry.
- 13. Entries for articles not listed in the Premium Book will not be accepted.
- 14. Exhibitors of Flowers, Vegetables, Fruits, Baked Goods, Needlework, and Hobbies **DO NOT** receive a free pass to enter the Fair.

THE BRIDGEWATER FIREMEN'S FAIR

Memorial Day Parade - Circa 1950's

Bridgewater is widely known as a small town with a big Fair. There are people, living in the mid-west who plan their vacations around the Bridgewater Fair so they may be in attendance. The attendance has grown yearly and has exceeded 40,000 people!

It was a very small Fair when it started 32 years ago. The first program was a modest, mimeographed brochure made by folding an $8^{1}/_{2}$ x 11 sheet in two. There were only three tents for the exhibits and three classes of entries - dairy, sheep and a miscellaneous class of vegetables and fruits, flowers and plants, and baked goods.

Today there are sixteen tents with a wide variety of attractions. All departments have been expanded and new ones added. New additions include: the State sheep show, 4-H exhibits, draft cattle, poultry displays, a collection of old machinery, and a photo contest. Also, the baking contest is always of interest.

Sadly, some old-fashioned activities like the horseshoe pitching contest have disappeared, but lumberjacks compete in showing their skill with the axe. The Sunday ox drawing always draws many onlookers. The Saturday night chicken barbecue is usually sold out.

All this is preceded Friday evening by a Firemen's parade that grows longer every year. The crowds of onlookers gather hours before the parade steps off.

For over thirty-two years many people have been involved in the success of Bridgewater's biggest event. But two long timers must be mentioned. The late Chet Boyd, the Fair's first chairman, presided over its destinies during the years of greatest expansion. The Chet Boyd Memorial Trophy has been established in his memory. Helen Stuart was Secretary of the Fair for about twenty-five years. Everybody became familiar with her voice booming out over the loudspeaker calling wandering officials back to the office or making important announcements.

The Fair is the Volunteer Firemen's chief money raiser. More than anything else, it pays for the shiny new equipment we admire so much in the parade and are so happy to see roll into our yards in times of trouble.

Let us not forget that the Firemen do not merely fight fires and drive the ambulance. They are on call in every emergency, whether it be flooded cellars that need pumping out or serious accidents. More and more, too, they are getting training for their jobs. What would we do without them?

CHET BOYD MEMORIAL TROPHY



Awarded annually in memory of our first Fair Chairman, Chet Boyd

Sponsoring families shall be limited to residents of Bridgewater. Families for this award shall consist of direct family lines; parents, children, grandchildren, etc.

The trophy will be based on total score received for various entries by the same family. The following points will be given:


Grand Champion Best of Show, etc.	15



1st time pullers will pull - must meet regulations at next pull.

- CLASS 1 Stock. Kids 6-10 yrs old, up to 12 hp with 23/10.5/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 2 Stock. Kids 11-14 yrs old, up to 12 hp with 23/10.5/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 3 Stock. Kids 6-14 yrs old, up to 14-20 hp with 26/12/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 3G GRAVELY. Kids 6-14 yrs old, with 26/10.5/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 4 Stock. Adult, 15+ yrs old, up to 11 hp with 23/10.5/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 5 Stock. Adult, 15+ yrs old, 12-16 hp with 23/10.5/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 6 Stock. Adult, 15+ yrs old, 17-20 hp with 26/12/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 6G GRAVELY. Adult, 15+ yrs old, with 26/12/12 or smaller tires
- CLASS 7 Stock Big Wheels. Kids 6-14 yrs old, up to 20 hp with 16-24" tires, no larger than 8.3 x 24 or 9.5
- CLASS 8 Stock Big Wheels. Adult 15+ yrs old, up to 20 hp with 16-24" tires, no larger than 8.3 x 24 or 9.5
- CLASS 9 Super Stock. Adult 15+ yrs old. Kids under the age of 15 years old may pull with approval of officials
- *IMPORTANT: The age of the puller on May 1st will determine the class he/she will pull to the entire season.

NOTE: Tractors with factory stock 15" rims will be classed on an individual basis. FYI: A 23/10.5/12 tire is 23" tall, 10.5" wide, and on a 12" rim. A 26/12/12 tire is 26" tall, 12" wide, and on a 12" rim.

GENERAL RULES - ALL CLASSES

Children under the age of fourteen (14) will not be allowed in the pit except when pulling - If two or more are pulling with the same tractor, children waiting must wait outside the pit.

- NEW REQUIEMENT: All tractors from Class 1 to Super Stock MUST have wheelie bars.
- 2. A full pull is 8 feet. If you pull under 2 feet, you have the option to try again first round only.
- 3. Boundary lines will be 10 feet apart. If tractor or stone boat hits the boundary lines, the driver and the tractor will be disqualified.
- 4. NO JERKING THE STONE BOAT. You must tighten the chain before pulling.
- 5. Drivers must remain seated IN THE SEAT. Drivers must keep one hand on the steering wheel at all times while pulling. No leaning back further than the back edge of the seat.
- ADULTS - Only one person, per tractor, per class. Two children from the immediate family, per tractor, may pull in the same class only if one tractor is used.

GARDEN TRACTOR PULL GENERAL RULES

continued

- 7. Kids 6-14 yrs old must be able to safely operate tractor to the satisfaction of our officials. Kids must also have an adult coach at ALL TIMES. Coaches must remain outside of the boundary lines at the time of the pull.
- 8. Officials will "class" and check all the tractors. Their judgments are final.
- 9. No horseplay or alcoholic beverages allowed. No passengers on the tractor.
- NO CHEATING! CHEAT ONCE: WARNING. CHEAT TWICE: MISS TWO PULLS. CHEAT 3 TIMES: KIDS OUT FOR THE SEASON / ADULTS OUT PERMANENTLY.
- 11. All tractors must have clevis or hole in draw bar large enough to accept hook from stone boat. Hole must be at least 2" in diameter. Hitch shall be located 1" below center line of rear axle.
- 12. Class winners will be allowed to move up to the next class pull they will COMPETE FOR FUN ONLY, NOT FOR RIBBONS.
- 13. Pulling committee and officials reserve the right to add any additional rules and correct any problems that happen at a pull.
- 14. After pulling, take your tractor directly to the truck or trailer it will be loaded on; no driving around the fair grounds. No speeding through the fair grounds or parking areas.
- 15. Only GAS pump fuel permitted no aviation, racing fuel!!
- 16. Only one driver per tractor per class (kids class may pull same tractor if family only has one).

STOCK GARDEN TRACTORS:

- Stock Garden tractors up to 20hp, 1 or 2 cylinders, gas. Engine cannot run over 3.600 rpm.
- 2. All tractors shall maintain original engine hp and number of cylinders. Any tractor not meeting engine requirements shall pull in SUPER STOCK.
- ALL tractors must have a rigid draw bar height for BIG WHEELS, Classes 7 and 8 will be 12 inches from the ground - Economy tractors will have a stock hitch that was original equipment or one rebuilt to original specs. NO BOLT ON DRAW BARS BEHIND THE REAR AXLE.
- 4. NO LOCKED REAR ENDS PERMITTED—THOSE EQUIPPED CAN NOT USE THEM. WE WILL BE WATCHING!!
- 5. Wheel Weights Classes 1-8
 - ➤ 8" thru 12" (can be homemade) not to exceed 75 lbs perwheel
 - Big Wheels Manufactured only; not to exceed 140 lbs per wheel. NOTE: Weights may be weighed any time at the discretion of an official; they must be removable.
- 6. Under mounted mowers are allowed. No chains over 10" long to hold mower deck of tractor. NO OTHER ATTACHMENTS.
- 7. No cut tires; no tire chains; no dual wheels; 4x4s; Crawlers; Steel Wheels; Pit Bulls; C-Peks or professional pulling tires.
- 8. WHEELIE BARS Must be strong enough to support tractor. Bars must be made of 2" sq. tubing, 1/8" thick, or flat stock, 1/4 x 21/4 max. brace 11/4 x 11/4 x 1/8 angle. Cross brace must not interfere with hitch or chain. Bars must not extend more than 4" behind the exterior of the tire, no more than 6 inches from the ground. They must have wheels or pads.

STOCK GARDEN TRACTORS

continued

- 9. Cub Cadets: MUST have a shield to deflect any flying parts to the ground in event of a mishap. Shield must be made of 16 gauge steel or 1/8" aluminum and surround the clutch housing on top and both sides.
- 10. Gravely tractors shall have a flywheel shield of extruded /expanded steel or 1/8 think plate no larger than 12' x 12'. It will be install to block the rear flywheel from hands
- 11. Stock seats only. NO CAR OR TRUCK SEATS, BUCKET SEATS OR OTHERWISE.

CLASS 9

- 1. Garden tractors up to 20 hp, one or two cylinder, 4 cycle, gasoline engines. Engines must come from a Garden tractor.
- 2. Tractor shall run Gas pump fuel only. No racing, Alcohol or aviation fuel permitted.
 3. Engines shall be stock not modified.
- 4. Tractors must maintain the look/Sheet metal of a stock garden tractor
- 5. Frame cannot be lengthened more than 4". Hood cannot be raised more than 3". Tractors must have wheelie bars that are strong enough to support the tractor. Wheelie bars must not extend 4" behind the exterior of the tire and will be no more than 6" from the ground. See Stock Tractor rules for requirements.
- 6. All tractors must have a rigid draw bar. Maximum draw bar height will be 14". Draw bars may not extend rearward more than 15" from the center of the axle. Rear engine tractors being the exception, with rigid draw bars being as close as possible to the engine.
- 7. Maximum engine RPM must not exceed 4000 RPM's and may be checked at any time. All tractors must have sufficient shielding of belts, chains, clutches, etc., to deflect any flying parts to the ground.
- 8. Any type of tire may be used. Tires can be modified. Maximum tire size will be 31/15.5/15. No dual wheels, tire chains or studs.
- 9. Super Stock tractors cannot pull in any other class. Tractor may not weight more than 1700 lbs. with 31/15.5/15 tires, and 1800 lbs. with 26/12.5x12 tires. Weight may be added to achieve these weights.
- 10. All tractor weights be secured to the chassis so they can not fall off. Any weights that fall off pull will be disqualified.
- 11. ANY TRACTOR NOT FULLY PASSING SAFETY INSPECTION SHALL NOT BE PERMITTED TO PULL.
- 12. Pullers are asked to provide pictures of tractor on scale with ticket.

NOTICE: Super Stock tractors will be weighted. There will be a one time fee for the scale to be paid by the puller. Tractors may be rechecked at any time at a later pull at no fee, and at the discretion of the officials.

Classes will not be pulled in number order in all fairness, so no class pulls first or last all season. Pulling order will be decided on day of event.

- 5. The winner if each class is the contestant that pulls the heaviest load the farthest distance. A Full Pull is 6 feet (72 inches).

All animals must be owned or leased by 5/1/2023. Juniors must be 7 years old by 1/1/2023 to exhibit dairy cattle. *Registration and lease papers are* **required**.

HEALTH RULES FOR CATTLE

- 1. All animals over 3 months must have a rabies vaccination certificate.
- 2. Exhibitors must have health certificates, test charts, and vaccination certificates to show their livestock at Connecticut Fairs and Shows.
- 3. Should animals originate from out-of-state, they must be from Brucellosis-Negative herds blood tested within 12 months. Official vaccinates over 18 months of age and non-vaccinates over 8 months old must be negative to the blood test within 30 days prior to shipment, and must be Tuberculosis-Negative, tested within 12 months of fair.
- 4. All animals should be in show condition for competition.
- 5. ANIMALS MUST BE ON THE FAIR GROUNDS BY 6:00 PM ON FRIDAY.
- 6. All livestock must remain on the grounds until 6:00 pm Sunday.
- 7. Bedding sawdust only, will be supplied by the Fair.

- Out-Of-State-Goats: All goats must be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that they are free of infectious and contagious disease and are not from a scrapie exposed herd. All goats must originate from brucellosis and TB-Free herd. Goats over 3 months old must test negative to TB and Brucellosis within 12 months of their first show date. Kids under 3 months of age may go on dam's test chart if the dam was tested within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. Weathers are exempt from brucellosis testing.

Health checks will be done as animals are unloaded.

Rabies vaccine is strongly recommended!

All animals should be in show condition for competition.

Animals must be on the fairgrounds by 5:00 pm on Friday and are not released until 6:00 pm Sunday.

Bedding - Sawdust only will be provided by the fair.

Show Whites/Khakis are required when showing!



- 4. Exhibits will not be released until Sunday 6:00 pm and must be picked up by 7:00 pm. Any unclaimed entries will be disposed of by the management.
- 5. First, Second and Third Place Ribbons will be awarded to deserving entries.
- 6. A trophy will be awarded for the Best of Show in Canning and Eggs for both Junior and Senior Divisions.
- 7. A Rosette will be awarded for Judges Choice in Canning and Eggs for both Junior and Senior Divisions.
- 8. Items will not be sold at the Fair.
- 9. Judging will begin promptly on Saturday at 1:00 pm.

EGGS

- 1. Any entry will be one dozen (12) eggs of any size or color, and / or a creative display of eggs. Eggs may be displayed in a carton, basket, or an arrangement determined by the participant.
- 2. All eggs should be clean and crack free. If eggs are decorated with colors, they should be of a non-toxic nature.

CANNING

- 1. Any vegetable, fruit, pickle product, relish, chili sauce, honey, jam, jelly, preserve, conserve, apple product or maple syrup may be entered, any size.
- 2. Labels are required for each individual entry. Participant's name should NOT be on the label.
- 3. According to the U.S.D.A. recommendations, no entries will be accepted with paraffin.
- 4. All canned goods must be exhibited in regular canning jars. Jars, rings, and lids must be clean and must be free of all residues, otherwise they will be disqualified.
- 5. Canning jar rings must remain on all canned products entered into the canning competition.
- 6. Entries will be judged on appearance, pack product, jars, labeling; each factor being given equal weight also in some instances judges reserve the right to open jars to check consistency, quality and taste.

SPECIAL ENTRY: An assortment of canning must be at least 5 jars or a small 15 x 15 inch entry related to canning.

Vegetable Exhibit Rules:

- 1. All Senior and Junior Division entries must be placed between 8:30 am and 12:00 noon on Friday. No entries will be accepted after that time. The exhibit will be closed at 12:00 noon for preparation and judging. No Pre-Registration is Required!
- 2. The <u>Junior Division</u> is strictly for exhibitors age 15 and under who <u>personally</u> bring in their own vegetables for entry. They must be able to verbalize the correct class, the variety, and answer questions about their garden. The entries must have been raised in their own garden, tended, and cared for during the growing season entirely by the Junior Exhibitor. No parents, grandparents, etc. are allowed to enter this division in the name of a Junior Exhibitor. No children of commercial growers, i.e. Farmstand or Farm Market sellers, are allowed to enter the Junior Division. They are welcome to enter in the Senior Division.
- 3. The exhibitor is responsible to provide the exact class, variety, and proper number of specimens as designated for judging for each entry. No exhibitor may have more than one entry in each class.
- 4. Each entry will be judged on uniformity in shape, size, color, and condition. Each entry should be of market size and eating quality, and be free of soil, disease, insect and mechanical injury.
- 5. Specimens should be trimmed. Roots should be left on beets, turnips, carrots, leeks, celery, and onions. Cabbage and cauliflower trimmed close so that only 3 or 4 leaves curl away from the head. Corn should be shucked. Leaves/ tops must be removed from carrots, rhubarb, and beets. Leeks should be trimmed. Grape tomatoes must be a cluster of specimens on a single stem.
- 6. "Best of Show" will be chosen from any class except Class 110 Any Vegetable Not Listed. The variety name must be listed for all specimens entered in any "Other" Class or for the Heirloom Tomato Class.
- 7. Ribbons and premium checks must be picked up on Sunday between the hours of 10:00 am to 5:00 pm. None will be mailed. Unclaimed prize money will be donated to the Bridgewater Fire Department. Note: Commercial growers receive ribbons but no premium payment.
- 8. All entries, with the exception of the potted specimen plants, become the property of the Fair Committee. **None will be returned or sold.** All entries (including all of the vegetable arrangement containers and bouquet vases) must remain on display until they are released at 6:00 pm on Sunday.

NOTE: The classes listed are the same for the Junior and Senior Divisions.

ASSOCIATION OF CONNECTICUT FAIRS 2023 Baking Contests Rules

Each year The Association of Connecticut Fairs sponsors baking contests open to the public at participating member fairs. There are separate contests for Junior and Adult divisions, each with a specific recipe. A Two-Crusted Apple Pie Baking contest is also held.

WHO MAY ENTER: The contests at each participating member fair is open to all men, women and juniors. Commercial, industrial or professional bakers are not eligible. Divisions: Juniors (ages 7 to 15 as of July 1st) and Adult.

HOW TO ENTER: All men, women or juniors entering a contest at any participating member fair is automatically entered and competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest at as many fairs as they wish until they win first prize. They will then represent that fair at the state baking contest. Please submit entries to both the local and state contest on disposable plates. The Association of Connecticut Fairs and the member fairs are not responsible for the return of plates, trays or containers.

JUDGING: Judging will be based on appearance, flavor and texture. The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges' score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Additions, deletions or substitutions in the recipe are not permitted and will result in disqualification. All decisions of the judges are final.

LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the local contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs and will then become eligible to submit their entry at the state contest. In the event that only one entry is received at the local contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, that entry must be awarded the first place ribbon.

STATE CONTEST: The state contest is held as part of the Fall Meeting and Convention of the Association of Connecticut Fairs. Entries for the state contest are accepted from 8:00 am to 10:00 a.m. on the day of the judging (contact your local fair or visit www.ctagfairs.org for the date and location). Judging will begin at 10:00 am. Contest winners are announced at the Fall Meeting. Each fair is responsible for contacting their contest winner and providing them with information. The Association of Connecticut Fairs does not contact individual fairs or contest winners in regards to contest and banquet reservations nor does the Association of Connecticut Fairs cover the costs of attending the awards banquet. NO BANQUET RESERVATIONS FOR CONTEST WINNERS WILL BE ACCEPTED AT THE DOOR.

All entries to the state contest become property of The Association of Connecticut Fairs.

Blueberry Buckle

Ingredients:

For the cake:

- ³/₄ cup white sugar
- ¹/₄ cup butter
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons lemon zest
- 1¹/₂ cups plus 1 tablespoon King Arthur Baking All-Purpose flour, divided
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

- ¹/₂ cup milk
- 1¹/₂ cups fresh blueberries

For the topping:

- ¹/₄ cup plus 1 tablespoon butter
- ¹/₄ cup brown sugar
- ¹/₄ cup white sugar
- ¹/₃ cup King Arthur Baking All-Purpose flour
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground cinnamon

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350° F.
- 2. Grease an 8x8-inch pan.
- 3. In a large bowl, cream ³/₄ cup white sugar, ¹/₄ cup butter, 1 egg, and the lemon zest together until fluffy.
- 4. In a separate bowl, combine 1¹/₂ cups flour with the baking powder and salt.
- 5. Add the dry ingredient mixture and the milk into the sugar mixture, alternating between the two as you add and mixing until just combined.
- Toss the blueberries with 1 tablespoon of flour.
- 7. Fold the blueberries into the batter.
- 8. Spread the batter evenly in the prepared pan.
- 9. For the topping, combine the butter, brown sugar, white sugar, flour, and cinnamon together in a small bowl until a crumbly mixture forms.
- 10. Sprinkle the topping mixture over the batter in the pan.
- 11. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, about 40-45 minutes.
- 12. Once cooled, cut into 9 equal pieces.

Submit five pieces on a white paper plate.

Ingredients:

Dough

- 3 cups King Arthur Baking Company
 All-Purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons instant yeast
- 1 ¹/₄ teaspoons salt
- 1 large egg
- ¹/₂ cup milk, lukewarm
- ¹/₄ cup water, lukewarm
- 3 tablespoons olive oil

Filling

- 1/2 cup shredded Fontina cheese
- ¹/₄ cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- ¹/₂ cup oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes
- 3 garlic cloves, peeled and minced
- 1 ½ tablespoons dried basil

Instructions:

- 1. **To make the dough:** Measure the flour and gently spoon it into a cup, then sweep off any excess. Combine all of the dough ingredients in a bowl, then mix and knead to make a smooth, very soft dough.
- 2. Place the dough in a lightly greased bowl, cover, and let it rise until it's doubled in size, about 45 to 60 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, thoroughly drain the tomatoes, patting them dry. Use kitchen shears or a sharp knife to cut them into smaller bits.
- 4. Place the dough on a lightly floured surface and pat or roll into a 22" x 8 $^{1}/_{2}$ " rectangle, deflating it slightly. Spread with the cheese, tomatoes, garlic, and basil.
- 5. Starting with one long edge, roll the dough into a log the long way. Pinch the edges to seal. Place the log seam-side down on a lightly greased or parchment -lined baking sheet.

- 6. Using kitchen shears, start $\frac{1}{2}$ " from one end and cut the log lengthwise down the center about 1" deep, to within $\frac{1}{2}$ " of the other end.
- 7. Keeping the cut side up, form an "S" shape. Tuck both ends under the center of the "S" to form a "figure 8;" pinch the ends together to seal. When shaping the loaf, tuck any larger pieces of tomato or basil down into the dough (to avoid char).
- 8. Cover and let rise in a warm place until double, 45 to 60 minutes.
- 9. While the loaf is rising, preheat the oven to 350°F.
- 10. Uncover the bread, and bake it for 35 to 40 minutes, tenting it with foil after 20 to 25 minutes to prevent over-browning.
- 11. Remove the bread from the oven and transfer it to a rack to cool.

Submit on foil-covered cardboard no wider than one inch from the bread.

- 2 teaspoons baking soda

- 1 ½ teaspoons salt

- ²/₃ cups chopped walnuts
- ²/₃ cup raisins

- 1 teaspoon dried rosemary, crushed.

- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon dill weed
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- ¼ cup finely chopped onion
- 2 ¼ cup all-purpose flour, divided.
- 1. In a mixing bowl, dissolve yeast in water.
- 2. Add milk, butter, sugar, rosemary, salt, dill, garlic powder, onion and 1 cup flour.

KING ARTHUR FLOUR JUNIOR RECIPE CHOCOLATE BREAKFAST MUFFINS



- ²/₃ cups cocoa
- 1 ¾ cups King Arthur flour
- 1 1/4 cups light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ¾ teaspoon salt

- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2 teaspoons vinegar
- 8 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1. Preheat the oven to 425°. Lightly grease 12 cup muffin pan.

- 4. Add the wet ingredients, along with melted butter, to the dry ingredients, stirring to blend.
- 5. Scoop the batter into 12 lightly greased muffin cups.
- 6. Bake muffins for 15 to 20 minutes or until toothpick or cake tester comes out clean.
- 7. Watch them closely, as they'll burn around edges if they bake to long.
- 8. Remove muffins from the oven and cool.
- 9. Submit 6 on a disposable plate wrapped in plastic wrap.

KING ARTHUR FLOUR SENIOR RECIPE APPLE CAKE WITH CARAMEL FROSTING

- 1 cup King Arthur whole wheat flour ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 1/3 cups King Arthur flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon all spice

- 8 tablespoons soft butter
- 4 cups cored, chopped, unpeeled

- 2. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the flours, sugars, baking soda, salt, and spices.
- 3. Cut in softened butter into chunks and add it along with the apples, nuts, raisins, and eggs.
- 4. Beat at medium speed until well blended.
- 5. Turn the batter into a greased and floured 9"x13" pan. Smooth the top.
- 6. Bake for 45 minutes, or until it springs back when lightly touched in the center.
- 7. Cool about 10 minutes and take out of pan and cool completely.

CARAMEL FROSTING

- 8 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- ½ cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1. Melt the butter in a heavy 2 quart sauce pan.
- 2. Stir in the salt and brown sugar and heat the mixture to boiling, stirring constantly.
- 3. Cook over low heat for 2 minutes, until the sugar is totally dissolved.
- 4. Stir in the milk and return to a boil.
- 5. Remove pan from the heat and cool to lukewarm.
- 6. Stir in the vanilla, then gradually stir in the powdered sugar.
- 7. Adjust consistency with a little more milk, if necessary.
- 8. Frost the top of the cake.
